THE OM WORLD FINALS

The 1984 OM World Finals had 416 teams competing at the University of Akron. Over 4,000 people stayed at Kent State University and the University of Akron for two to four nights. Over 130 people judged, kept score, and helped with general tournament assistance. The competition ran on schedule for the two day event. The facilities provided by the University of Akron for the competition were excellent. The Pep Rally, Award Ceremony and several competitions took place in the beautiful new Health and Physical Education Field House.

THE PEP RALLY

The 8,000 seat gymnasium was filled. Students entered and received continuous applause. It was heart warming to see the participants from Canada march around the arena and to receive a standing ovation their entire way. The hat and banner contests continue to border on the unbelievable. Hats ranged from a team being part of a castle, to whales lazily rolling in the sea and spouting CO2, to perhaps the longest hat ever made. It seemed to have over fifty people under it. Each of the ten runners-up received a trophy and the overall winner received a special hat trophy.

The banners were equally fantastic. Creative, artistic, beautiful, colorful, wonderful craftsmanship are but a few adjectives to describe them.

LIPPER AWARD PRESENTED

This year's winner of the Lipper Award, presented at the Akron World Finals, was Mr. Charles H. Clark of Kent, Ohio. Mr. Clark is founder and president of Yankee Ingenuity Programs, a firm offering workshops to stimulate creativity and innovation in industry, government, schools, and the voluntary sector.

In addition to writing several articles on management education techniques, Mr. Clark authored Brainstorming in 1958 and two privately copyrighted manuals on creativity, How to Brainstorm for Profitable Ideas and The Crawford Slip Writing Method. Earlier, he had been an editorial assistant to Alex Osborn for Applied Imagination. Most recently, he wrote Idea Management: How to Motivate Creativity and Innovation, published by the American Management Association.

The Lipper Award is presented annually to honor an individual for outstanding contributions to the development of human creativity.

TRAGEDY MARS WORLD FINALS

Comments made by Robert Geigle, South Dakota OM Association Director at the 1984 World Finals Coaches' Competition.

"Our days are filled with many joys and many exciting, happy moments, and I trust that each of you have had a day just like that.

On the other hand, our days are sometimes darkened by events and happenings which we often can not explain, let alone have the capacity to understand. Today at about 8:30 a.m. one of these things happened that sorrows our spirits. Two judges from Maryland for the competition were seriously injured in a car accident. Both are in the hospital with one in very critical condition.

When tragic events like this happen, it is easy to find fault, to place blame, to get mad and even to take revenge. These actions just make our emotions run high and out-of-control, and thus no productive action is forthcoming. Further, these negative actions cannot change what happened. The tragedy has already taken place. In all aspects of life, we would all like to believe that we are in ultimate control, with these kinds of things demonstrating that it is not true.

So at this time, I want to ask each of you to turn to a positive kind of activity. Because I am aware of the fact that this group has representatives from many different religions, faiths, and beliefs, I am asking each of you in your own way to remember these two individuals in your silent thoughts now and I hope later in your private quarters. In doing this I would ask that you call upon that Spirit that you believe gives vitality, strength, and comfort to your life, and that could give a new purpose and a renewed strength to our two injured friends.

So now I ask you, each student, coach, sponsors, fellow judges and friends to stand for a minute of silence and to think positive thoughts for their recovery.

Thank you."

OM BOARD BRIEFS

At its October board meeting the OM Board of Directors welcomed three new members. They are Dan Nemode, former OM director for Michigan, Dr. Ron Todd, professor, New York University. and Dr. Jim Pallante, Academic Dean, College Misericordia, Pennsylvania. Elected as chairperson was Carole Micklus and as vice-chairperson, Dr. Al Oliver. A proposal committee was established to develop policies for gifts, grants and contracts. An executive committee consisting of Sam Micklus, Ron Todd, Al Oliver and Carole Micklus was established. A proposal to establish a "Friends of OM" or "Advisors to the Board" group was approved. The U.S. Olympic Committee's decision not to allow OM permission to use the word "Olympics" past this academic year was discussed.


SPECIAL PRIMARY PROBLEM

The Program Governance Committee (Directors of OM Chartered Associations) voted at its meeting in Akron to include in the membership packets a special problem for use with grades K-2. This would be a "Primary Problem" and would not be competitive. It would be used to develop creative problem solving skills in younger children and to prepare them for competition in later years. It would be up to each association as to whether these students would be invited to demonstrate their solution at an association sponsored competition. They will not be included in the World Finals. Division I will still have four problems and will be open for competition to grades K-5.

1985 WORLD FINALS SET FOR UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND

The University of Maryland at College Park will be the host for the 1985 OM World Finals competition. The dates are June 5-7, 1985. More information will follow in subsequent newsletters.

MEMBERSHIP RENEWALS

If you have not renewed your OM membership for 1984-85 and want to be included in the initial mailing of membership materials in September, we must have your order by August 20. Memberships are processed in the order they are received. After the initial September mailing, allow three to four weeks for processing and delivery. We use the U.S. Postal Service to send out membership materials.

PRESENTATIONS

Dr. Karen Verbeke, State Director of Maryland and National OM Board Member, recently made three presentations for OM. These included the National Collegiate Honors Council in Amherst, Massachusetts; the Northern Virginia Council for Gifted and Talented Education in Fairfax, Virginia; and the Baltimore City Schools in Baltimore, Maryland.

Mr. Ronald Dalrymple of the Maryland State OM Association recently made a presentation for OM at the International MENSA Society Meeting in Washington, DC.

Dr. Al Oliver, National OM Board Member and former Pennsylvania OM Director, will make a presentation, "Meeting the OM Challenge," at the National Association for Gifted Children conference in St. Louis, Missouri on November 9, 1984. Dr. Oliver will also be presenting the OM program at the Iowa Talented and Gifted Conference on October 16.

FRIENDS OF OM CREATED

The board of OM has created a new support group called Friends of OM which will provide assistance in encouraging the growth and success of the program. The group will consist initially of William H. Jones, Arthur Lipper III and Paul Torrance, all previous winners of the Lipper Award.

Projects will be assigned to the group by the OM board as problems and opportunities develop. Initially, the group will be exploring opportunities to retain use of the Olympics name and possibilities for industrial sponsorship of scholarships for OM winners.

NAME CHANGE

The U.S. Olympic Committee by virtue of Public Law 95-606 has the exclusive right to use the word "Olympic" and its derivatives. It may grant or withhold permission for its use to whomever it chooses. It brought suit against the March of Dimes for using "Reading Olympics." Our understanding is that it is now about to sue the Para-Olympics (wheelchair group). It has denied permission to OM to continue using the word in our program title, "Olympics of the Mind." It has, however, granted permission to the Joseph P. Kennedy Foundation for use of "Special Olympics." This permission, to the best of our knowledge, is the only one given by the U.S. Olympic Committee for use of the word in a competitive situation.

We will be taking our fight for the name to the media and to congress. However, in the meantime, we must discontinue its use for 1984-85. The program which the OM Association sponsors will be known as the OM program rather than the Olympics of the Mind in the immediate future.
