Chinese Team Delights Everyone

he stands filled. Excitement mounted. A most enthusiastic "Gift of Flight," Division II team from Shanghai, China, composed of four boys and one girl, prepared to compete. Although not fluent in English, by smiling and waving, the team members communicated extremely well with the audience.

During the long-term style presentation, one team member exhibited his gymnastic abilities by executing a kip and a roundoff. The team received a standing ovation for its performance and its uniqueness to the competition.

A special airplane was constructed for the free choice style category. The style airplane was propelled by a single thin rubber band approximately four feet in length. By the rubber band's winding onto itself, the slow-to-release rubber band moved the propeller. Materials used in the plane's construction consisted of very thin styrofoam for wings, reeds for the body and propeller, and the rubber band. Thin wire, glue, and thin nylon thread held the parts together. To the audience's astonishment, this rubber band-powered plane stayed aloft in Cole Field House for over two minutes. Zhao Xu Yang, the plane's designer, won a Ranatra Fusca.

The Chevron Corporation honored them with a luncheon as they stopped in San Francisco on their return home. San Francisco mayor, Art Agnos, wrote an official proclamation honoring the team from Shanghai.



OM NOTES

- Connie Hicks, Florida OM association director, reports
 that the Florida association's first OMERFEST was held
 in conjunction with the state competition. The OMERFEST's goals were for the team members to get to know
 each other in a non-competitive situation, to fill time
 between competition and the awards ceremony, and to
 provide entertainment. Trick skateboard riders provided
 part of the entertainment.
- How about this for making certain your team's structure arrives safely? Due to time constraints, Dr. Don Watson, heart transplant surgeon and OM associate member, rented a plane to pilot himself and his daughter to Mt. Pleasant, Michigan for the 1987 world finals. He also took the team's three structures to insure their safety of flight.
- We are extremely pleased to learn of Dr. Dorothy Sisk's future involvement with the Florida OM Association. A noted gifted education expert, Dr. Sisk will present the Odyssey of the Mind program during her forthcoming tour of Russia.
- Edward Jenney, Shiloh, OH must have been pleasantly surprised. On his application to General Motors Institue, Edward wrote of his involvement with coaching a Division I "Straddle Structure" team from Ashland. As part of the OM scholarship program, GMI had given a \$1,000 scholarship to be given to an incoming freshman. No one applied for it. Admissions officials remembered Edward had listed OM experience on his application and offered him the scholarship without his applying for it.
- Several colleges/universities report to us that they give special considerations to incoming freshmen listing OM involvement on their applications.
- IBM in Wausau has agreed to provide computers and personnel for next year's Wisconsin state tournament.
- Ashwaubeon School District in Green Bay, Wisconsin pays its coaches three percent of their base salary to coach plus a bonus for every team the coaches recruit.
- Plans are underway for the second annual fall program governance committee meeting. Denver, Colorado will be the location to enable the association directors to inspect the University of Colorado in Boulder, site of the 1989 world finals.
- **IBM in North Carolina** furnished trophies, ribbons, and program covers for all regional tournaments and the state tournament.
- Bruce Bartlett, Ph.D., principal of Shepardson Elementary School in the Poudre School District R-1, Fort Collins, has been named Colorado's National Distinguished Elementary Principal for 1988. Jointly sponsored by the U.S. Education Department and the National Association of Elementary School Principals, the National Distinguished Principals Program was launched in 1984 as an annual event. Six Odyssey of the Mind teams from Shepardson Elementary School participated in their district tournament.

The Lipper Award

Each year at world finals the Lipper Award is presented to an individual and/or organization for significant contributions to the development of human creativity. The OM Association this year proudly presented the award to the MacArthur Foundation. Kenneth W. Hope, director of the MacArthur Fellows Program, accepted the award.

The Fellows Program of the MacArthur Foundation is widely recognized for its support of creative individuals and projects. The prestigious MacArthur Fellowships, commonly known as the "Genius Awards," are presented each year to individuals in arts and sciences. The five-year awards range from \$128,000 to \$300,000, depending on the age of the recipient.

The Lipper Award is in honor of Arthur Lipper III, trustee of the Lipper Foundation, early supporter of the Odyssey of the Mind Program and the award's first recipient in 1981. Other recipients were Dr. E. Paul Torrence, Bill Jones and the Chevron Corporation, Charles Clark, Walt Disney and The Walt Disney World Company, Dr. Paul B. MacCready and Dr. Sidney J. Parnes.

In the world finals award ceremony audience were past Lipper awardees: Arthur Lipper III, Charles Clark and William Jones.

Ranatra Fusca Creativity Awards

Odyssey of the Mind's prestigious Ranatra Fusca Awards for outstanding creativity were given to sixteen teams and five individuals. The persons or teams won the awards for creativity in either the long-term or the spontaneous portions of the competition. Special Ranatra Fusca medals were awarded to those students recognized as most creative in their individual problem and division.

WORLD FINALS ROUNDUP

- Six hundred and two teams competed. One hundred and ninety-eight adults judged or provided tournament assistance. Competition began at 1:00 on Thursday afternoon and spanned two and one-half days. Approximately 10,000 persons attended the awards ceremony. This was our biggest world finals.
- Approximately 1,500 judges, coaches and honored guests enjoyed the Saturday night coaches' "recovery party." The University of Maryland dining services did an outstanding job preparing delicious food for the occasion. A teen and a separate pre-teen party with disc jockeys ran concurrent so the coaches could enjoy their "recovery party."
- The Chinese coach, interpreter and chaperon enjoyed themselves at the coaches' "recovery party." Everyone made them feel at ease as the Chinese became the center of the dancing and party goers took turns dancing "American style" with them.
- The First United States Army Band from Fort Meade, Maryland was featured as the major entertainment for the Thursday night program.
- An IBM affiliate in Nebraska helped finance a Nebraska world finalist team's trip to Maryland.
- Federal Express, home-based in Memphis, flew the Hutchinson School's props complimentary to world finals. Holiday Inn, also home-based in Memphis, gave the Hutchinson School a 40 percent discount on housing for world finals for its College Park, Maryland motel.
- Baker Elementary School, Albuquerque represented all four Division I teams from New Mexico.
- Sixth grader, April Morgan from Frazeyburg, Ohio participated in her fourth consecutive world finals.
- Families seem to like the Washington, DC area as a

OM Association Board Briefs

Approved at the June 5, 1988 OM Association directors' board meeting, the following is a synopsis of the March 6, 1988 minutes.

The following motions were made and carried:

- To accept the amended November 1, 1987 minutes.
- · To accept the treasurer's report.
- To have the OM Association attorney write a statement about the treasurer's duties to be incorporated into the by-laws.
- To draft a pilot study proposal on ways to structure membership. Several states that vary geographically and in membership will be selected for the study.
- To investigate a corporate level creative problem-solving competition.
- To accept the directors' and officers' liability insurance coverage package.
- To adopt an employees' benefits plan with a four percent compensation based on salary effective August 1, 1988.
- To accept full responsibility to run the Division IV Odyssey of the Mind Program.
- To accept the proposed Lipper Award nominee.
- To compensate the scholarship committee chairperson, including expenses, up to \$1,000.

A scholarship committee report revealed that this year 105 applicants representing 25 associations applied for the OM scholarships. One third of the applicants were interested in furthering their education in the engineering field.

For the 1988-89 year, International Business Machines will continue to sponsor OM Association.
