# 15th Annual World Finals Celebration

he 1994 World Finals proved to be our best event ever! With 14 countries represented and a record 710 teams competing, participants were mesmerized by the innovative solutions and dazzled by the sights and sounds of the evening festivities.

Opening ceremonies unfolded on Wednesday evening with a parade of representatives from the 14 attending countries. After several speakers welcomed OMers to the big event, Dr. Micklus set the tone for this year's anniversary competition. His remarks focused on what the participants achieved this year when he said, "There are many team members here, who, when given this year's competition problems, asked each other, 'Where do we begin?' Some tried out ideas that didn't work. There may have even been tears of disappointment. You accepted things that went wrong and tried again and again. Some of you came up with solutions only to say, 'It's not good enough. Let's start over and make it better.' Boys and girls, ladies and gentlemen, this is what champions are made of."

Following Dr. Micklus' remarks, the crowd engaged in a recitation of the OM pledge. The finale for the opening ceremonies included a confetti shoot, indoor fireworks and a dramatic balloon drop. Each balloon contained the name and address of a team member, giving each participant a pen pal from this World Finals event.

The following day, the traditional Hat, Float and Banner Contest was held. For the first time, associations could register an entry in *each one* of the events. Fashion appeared to reign as this year's theme. The crowd watched a five-person team t-shirt, a two-

Creativity Festival -

he 15th annual OM World Finals was peppered with interesting and innovative activities for all participants, regardless of age or level of participation. Among the more unusual events was the Creativity Festival, held at the Recreation Center on the campus of Iowa State University. Here, ingenuity reigned not only inside the creative booths that housed the various activities, but outside as well, where the barkers' pleas lured onlookers into the action.

For the festival, each OM chartered association was invited to design an activity that involved a creative game or presentation. In turn, each team was given a bag full of tokens. These tokens were used by team members as payment for the festival activities.

There were many varied and creative games to challenge the spirited and the adventurous. For example, Arkansas had

# New Weight-Held Record Set In 1994!

In 1992, World Finals championship teams in the structure problem set records—in each division—that broke the existing mark of 978 lbs. The existing record that teams shattered had been unmovable since 1983. The new records set exceeded the old by a substantial amount: Division I held 1025 lbs; Division II, 1150 lbs; and Division III, 1145 lbs. There was speculation that these new records would remain stable for some time. The following year, however, that theory proved to be untrue. The record weights held in 1992 were shattered in 1993—in all divisions—via the problem, WHICH END IS UP? A Division III team held 1210 lbs, an incredible number to beat.

The problem specs changed in '93-94. Weights held were "increased" by bonus points. However, that did not stop teams from setting new records for actual weight held, without factoring the effect of bonus points. In Division I, the highest weight held, sans bonus points, was 1080 lbs. In Division II, the highest weight held was 1195 lbs. And, in Division III, the team from Wylie Grove HS, in Beverly Hills, MI, held an incredible 1465 lbs, breaking all previous records. Will there be a "new twist" on record breaking in '94-95? Only time will tell...

two different activities going on simultaneously. In this booth, treasure-seekers with a quick eye or a quick hand could either sift through sand for Arkansas (crystal) diamonds or skillfully "flip" OMER into a bucket. British Columbia supplied both tennis and velcro balls and challenged participants to aim at a totem pole and either move the balls through a hoop or adhere them directly to the pole. Florida orchestrated a wet-sponge throw for amusement. Human faces popped out of handmade cardboard cut-outs of alligators and flamingos. The object, was-you guessed it-to hit your "favorite critter's face" with a wet sponge. "Walking on peaches"—until the music stopped—gave some of the big spenders at the festival a prized Georgia peach pin. Japan tested participants's agility to pick up glass ballswith chopsticks-in a 30-second time frame. Michigan invited the more mobile to "drive" a car (Matchbox variety) into one of four cites in Michigan and "park" it in a garage.

Participants checking out the Midwest consortium's booth had many activities from which to choose. "Create a critter" used rubber stamps depicting various animal parts to entice participants to devise a new breed of animal. "Make a mask" gave aspiring designers the opportunity to fashion a glitter and confetti mask suitable for Mardi Gras. Panning for Iowa gold in a pool of corn helped lucky winners cash in on a special prize.

Finally, for those who dared to undergo an electrifying experience, The Science Center of Iowa demonstrated the Vandergraf generator, leaving participants at this booth with their hair standing on end—literally. New Hampshire featured a token toss, Oklahoma offered "miniature" golf, and Oregon's jackpot spinner ensured that everyone walked away with a prize. Tennessee challenged participants to demonstrate their wind power, while honorary Texas "cowboys" showed their brawn by knocking

down well-known Texans such as Ross Perot and Troy Akerman. Pins, candy and other awards were given by some booth personnel to those who displayed the required skills.

Perhaps the most intriguing display came from Norland, Washington. A 25-foot fiberglass Salmon invited participants to walk inside the fish to view a display of the habitat of the Olympic peninsula.

The festival ran from Thursday, June 2 through Saturday, June 4. Cash prizes were awarded to Texas, Arkansas and Georgia for the entries garnering the largest number of tokens.

### REFLECTIONS—FROM BOTH SIDES NOW

Take a scene from the *Odyssey* and make it funny. That was my first OM problem in 1982. At that time, I was involved with what was then called Olympics of the Mind.

Take a scene from the *Iliad* and a scene from 20th-century history and incorporate a piece of artwork. That was my latest OM problem, in 1994.

The first problem was mine, as an OM participant at Sayreville Junior High School, in Sayreville, NJ. The last problem was my team's, an elementary school team from North Oaks Elemenatary School in Austin, TX. Obviously, I chose the *Iliad* problem for sentimental reasons of Homeric proportion. (What is OM without puns?)

For our *Odyssey* problem, we made Cyclops into Pac-Man. We didn't make it past locals. The second year, we were part of the Mousemobile relays. Our mousetrap cars didn't move an inch, but we did get perfect scores on Style and in spontaneous. We still didn't make it past locals.

OM certainly taught me how to fail.

The third year, with Music Maestro, Please, we won the World Finals. Our piece, about Adam taking the apple and

destroying the world, made the judges cry. How often does that happen with OM?

Then I moved to a mega-school district in Houston and I cried because it became OM, who?

As an adult I consider OM to be the best experience in my 17 years in public schools, and I want the kids to get the same kind of experiences that I've had. I have learned to fail, to make a fool of myself, to think creatively, to brainstorm, to tolerate unusual ideas and to work as a team—and to sew, cut, paste, glitter and dance.

After leading my team to personal victory, but not to OM victory, I volunteered at Texas association finals. I think I was probably the only one there without a child or a teaching certificate. I am also on the board of the Capital-Area OM Region. I have many other volunteer commitments, but I knew I could never forgive myself if I didn't get as involved in OM as I could.

Regionals for me this year was somewhat sad. I was there as a coach, not as a kid. It wasn't my turn any more. But as long as I can give others the opportunities I've had, it isn't so bad.

Long live OM!

\* Jacqueline Otis, a 1989 OM scholarship winner and 1989 OM World Finalist, graduated from the Air Force Academy this year. After witnessing Jacqueline's graduation from the Academy, her mom, dad and sister attended the OM World Finals in Ames, IA. They arrived on Friday, in time to celebrate Jamiee Otis's graduation from high school—OM Style. Jamiee and her six teammates missed the commencement held that same night at their alma mater, Indian Creek High School in Wintersville, Ohio. The team, coached by proud parent/coaches Dana and Carol Otis, competed in the Classics problem, Division III.

Editor's note: Indian Creek High School finished fifth this year, in The Iliad, Division III.

- \* Graduation ceremonies were squeezed into many World Finals schedules as **Christy Coons** can attest. She graduated summa cum laude from James Madison University in VA, and moved right into her judging commitment at World Finals the following week. Christy was joined in Iowa by mom and dad, Becky and Terry, who also served as World Finals officials this year. **Becky Coons** serves as a regional director for Maryland OM.
- \* Another commencement narrative comes from New Martinsville, WV. It seems **Tom Myslinsky**, Magnolia High School's Division III, *Set it Free* team coach, had more than one commitment to honor during the OM World Finals this year. To sandwich it all in, Tom's team traveled by car to World Finals and competed on Thursday. The following day, Tom flew back to West Virginia for his next big event, graduation with his son. Then Tom commuted back to ISU on Saturday to witness closing ceremonies with his team!
- \* West Virginia's second notable story centers around the town of Fairmont. This year, that town sent eight teams to participate in the 1994 OM World Finals. Six of these teams hailed from East Dale Elementary School. The other teams represented East Fairmont Junior High and East Fairmont High School.

East Dale began participation in the 1986-87 membership year. That first year one team captured first place in the association finals. It went on to World Finals and finished last among the competitors there. However, the trip proved to be a valuable experience and sparked interest among other potential OM participants. As you might imagine, the schools have been fielding more and more OM teams each year.

Editor's Note: East Dale finished second this year, in The Iliad, Division II.

- \* Kendale Lakes School, in Miami, FL, brought three Division I teams to the 1994 OM World Finals. Those teams finished first in *OM-Believable Music*, Division I; fourth in The *Iliad*, Division I; and first in *Furs*, *Fins and Feathers*, Division I. In each instance the Kendale Lakes team held the highest Style score of the problem, division. One of the teams also garnered an Outstanding OMER Award. Coach Rhea Berger wrote to tell us that in the 11 years the school has participated in OM, fourth at Worlds was the highest place any Kendale Lakes team has ever captured. Getting two additional first-place awards was quite a feat. "It just proves," says Rhea, "that if you continue to try, work hard and have a goal, you can do it!"
- \* AW Cox School Team A from Guilford, CT, placed fourth in Set it Free, Division I. The team also won a Ranatra Fusca Award. To add more accolades, team member Daniel Rubin won an individual Outstanding OMER Award.

\* Coach Ginny Sprague from St. Francis de Sales Elementary School, Muskegon, MI, reports that her school celebrates the OM experience with an OM banquet and OMIE Awards. A potluck dinner is given for OMers, their parents, and the judges they bring to the regional competition. At the conclusion of the meal, each coach presents the OMIE awards for his/her team.

The **OMIE** awards are written by each coach about his/her team members. (This is the coach's opportunity to be creative.) These awards recognize each child's accomplishments.

\* Many schools see OM participation as an ongoing part of an extracurricular program as more and more students choose to participate over the course of their four years in high school. As a result, junior and varsity letters are often awarded by the school. School requirements for an OM letter vary. For example, a student may receive a letter if she or he logs a certain number of hours of time in team participation in a given year. Often, there are other contingencies, such as moving up the ladder of competition.

#### **OM VIDEOS WIN TWO AWARDS**

A "Telly" and a "Cindy" plaque are now new additions to the OM video trophy case. These are two of the most respected awards given to cite the accomplishments of nonbroadcast television production. For the thousands of companies that produce corporate videos, Cindys and Tellys are the equivalent of broadcast emmys.

The Telly Award was awarded to OM Association, Inc. for "the OM signature animation." The 45-second animation, which introduces Odyssey of the Mind in a quick, creative story, appears at the beginning of all OM "instructional" videos. Dr. C. Samuel Micklus, Founder of Odyssey of the Mind, and Carole Micklus, Executive Director of OM Association, Inc., conceived the idea for the animation. It was produced by Ned Eckhardt, OM's video consultant. This is the second award Ned has received for the signature animation. The first, a silver plaque from the Chicago International Film and Video Festival, was awarded in 1992.

This year the 14-year-old Telly Awards received over 7900 video entries in various categories. Only 5 percent of these entries were named winners.

The Cindy Award recognized the 1993 OM World Finals Video Yearbook. As you may know, each year OM Association produces a one-hour documentary of the World Finals event. This "video yearbook" captures the spirit, excitement, pageantry, competition and sometimes offbeat antics of the 15,000 OMers who enjoy the event. Co-hosts of the video are Jennifer Devine and our best friend, OMER. OM has two professional crews that shoot all of the video footage under the direction of Ned Eckhardt.

RAC Productions, a production company headed by honorary OMers Pete Sanford and Bob Christensen, coordinates the video field crews and produces all the arena events at the World Finals sites. Ned writes the script for and edits the World Finals tape each summer for an annual October release.

The international Cindy awards are 35 years old and are recognized for their dedication to honoring excellence in all forms of video production. The non-profit Cindy organization gives awards to 15 percent of all the entrants.

# **Briefly Speaking**

The Board of Directors met on May 8, 1994, at which time the minutes of the January 16, 1994, meeting were approved. Highlights of the January meeting follow:

- \* The membership report indicated a total of 11,054 members as of January 11, 1994. The Board expressed a desire for future membership reports to include more statistical data.
- \* Nancy Wingenbach, president of the OM Association Directors Advisory Board (OMADAB), presented a report to the Board on the "Evolution of OMADAB."
- \* The Scholarship Committee noted that it completed its long-range objectives.
- \* The Management Committee reported completion of all but three objectives.
- \* The Awards Committee recommended that all the applications for the Spirit of OM Award be kept on file for a period of two years and that a nominee for one year be considered for the following year.
- \* The Finance Committee reported that work on its final two objectives is proceeding.
- \* The Research Committee approved two questions that will be the basis for a doctoral dissertation competition award and program.
- \* The Programs Committee is planning two OM-sponsored conferences for the future. In addition, the World Initiative on Life-Long Learning (WILL) Conference will take place November 30-December 2, 1994, in Rome, Italy. OM Association, Inc. is a partner in this endeavor.
- \*The Community Pilot was reported to be in place at sites in VA and DC.
- \* The Programs Committee recommended that the Odyssey of the Mind School Program divisions be delineated by age. This was approved by the Board.

# Community Pilot Expansion Planned for '95

In 1994, OM Association, Inc. piloted a new community program initiative. This program's purpose is to expand our Odyssey of the Mind program beyond the school setting by providing additional opportunities for children to participate in the Odyssey of the Mind activities. It is our hope that children from areas that are not presently active in the school-based program can find an alternative forum of community sponsorship. Possible target groups for the pilot include, but are not limited to: Children's and Science Museums, Community Service Programs, Community Organizations and Youth Organizations.

Groups interested in participating in the next phase of the pilot, slated to begin September of the 1994-95 year, are encouraged to contact Janet D'Alessandro at OM headquarters for more information. Additional sites will be selected for the expanded program.

#### In Memoriam

James A. Bognar, coach of the North Olmsted, Ohio, structure team, passed away on Monday, May 16, 1994. Mr. Bognar had been involved with Odyssey of the Mind for the past 11 years. A local newspaper quoted Mr. Bognar as saying, "Odyssey of the Mind is a place where you can make a difference in future generations by instilling today's kids with confidence to try their own unique ideas, giving them the confidence they need to build new things in their adult world."

This year, despite an illness that eventually claimed his life, Mr. Bognar coached his Set it Free team—a world-class team bound for World Finals—through the middle of May. Jim Bognar will be remembered for many things. Among them is his ability to meet life's toughest challenges.


