Reggie Bunis, OM International Spontaneous Problem Co-Captain, has created an interactive Spontaneous activity entitled the "OM Spontaneous Playhouse." When you come to the Playhouse, just knock (click) on the front door and go poking around the house. You will find places and things that open, make sounds and have pages of Spontaneous problems that have been written for you to use in your meetings, or for kids to explore in school or at home. Currently, there are enough problems for you to download and have a page a week to practice all new problems for the next three months! We even have a library if you want to do a total download of all problems. The pages of problems are written in 'entry level' and 'advanced level' with variations and techniques so that new teams and experienced teams will be able to have fun and learn about Spontaneous.

Every image (except for the Playhouse kitchen) is original and hand drawn by Reggie's best friend, Sharon Himes, a nationally recognized water color artist. The kitchen in the Playhouse was drawn by OM coach and wonderful listperson, Lynette Crain, a gifted artist as you will see. Each problem is original and not published anywhere else. If anyone would like to contribute images or problems to the Playhouse, there are guidelines which can be found if you click on the mailbox on the front page of the Playhouse.

Learning to be comfortable with problem solving is a life skill....a process....that is the essence of OM. Traditionally, some OMers have thought of Spontaneous as some mysterious part of OM. One of the intentions of the Playhouse, besides just having fun, is to acquaint OM participants with a variety of Spontaneous problems so their first experience at solving them



is not at their first tournament. It has always been the intention of OM to have participants encounter a positive experience in the Spontaneous segment of the program. Although as Forrest Gump once said, "You never know what you're going to get," the Spontaneous encounter should reflect the learning Odyssey teams experience and should be a highlight in the process of life-long divergent problem solving.



We are very happy to announce Alaska as one of OM's two newest C h a r t e r e d Associations. The



Some planes make two trips just to get one OM team to a location where they can travel by road. The International Association of Lions Club - Badger Road Group and POLARIS, a science teacher organization, have helped "grow" the OM program in Alaska by funding travel to remote locations and providing awards for team members.

Sid Brockman has been active in OM since 1985 when he began coaching his daughter's team. In 1987, the team placed fourth at World Finals. Since

1988, Sid has judged at every tournament level including 9 years at World Finals — 7 years as Head Judge and one year as Assistant Problem Captain. He was the Head Judge of the only judging team to be awarded a Ranatra Fusca. Sid has been Regional Problem Captain, Association PC, member of the Association Board of Directors and the Community Advisory Board, and has trained coaches and judges. 1999 World Finals Coaches' & Officials' Problem:

RACEY RELAY®

Purist Division: Team must solve the problem without outside assistance. **Poetic License Division:** Team may get help from others.

A. What is the team's problem?

This year, the Coaches' and Officials' Problem incorporates all the excitement and aspects of a team competition. Included are elements of teamwork, a Long-Term solution, *Style*, and Spontaneous.

This problem requires a team to accurately travel to a finish line in a relay race. It will consist of three stages: construction, driving and flying. During the performance, the team will construct a "flying thing," transport it on a team-made vehicle, and fly it towards a target line.

B. How will the team's solution be evaluated?

The score will be determined by the distance from the Target Line C, and the Style component. The distance is measured in inches from the Target Line C to the part of the "flying thing" that is closest to Line C. The Style element is evaluated from 1 to 10 points, 1 being the best score. The lowest total score is the winner.

C. What must the team know and do?


- 1. Teams will consist of 2 or 3 people. These will be either pre-established or developed on site. The team includes a Builder, Driver and Pilot. If only two members, then the role of Builder and Driver will be assumed by one person.
- 2. Each team is issued a single sheet of paper with team identification number on it.
- 3. The vehicle must fit within a 12" x 12" x12" area.
- 4. Prior to the start, the vehicle will be placed at the Start Line. When time "begins" the teams will proceed to their places in an "Indy" type start. The Builder will construct a "flying thing" from only the sheet of paper. NOTHING else may be used. The "flying thing" must remain as one piece for the entire time. The Pilot will be waiting in the area between Lines A and B to receive the vehicle.
- 5. The "flying thing" will then be placed on the teammade vehicle, which will be released behind the Start Line, by the Driver. No team member may be in the area between the Start Line and Line A while the vehicle is in motion.
- 6. The vehicle is to cross Line A, 20 feet away. The Pilot will stop the vehicle, and remove the "flying thing."

- 7. If the vehicle crosses Line A within a marked 4' lane, then the Pilot will proceed to Line B (five feet away) and launch the "flying thing" towards Line C. If it crosses Line A outside the lane, the launch is from behind Line A. The "flying thing" must cross an Obstacle (3' high) that is 5' in front of Line C. The distance (in inches) from Line C to the "flying thing" will be measured and this will be the distance score (shortest is best).
- 8. The *Style* score is based on the appearance of the vehicle, the costume and the "performance" of the Pilot. It will be scored on a scale of 1 to 10 where lowest is best and then be combined with the distance score.
- The lowest total score wins. Total time allowed is 5 minutes.
- 10. There will be no clarifications for this problem.
